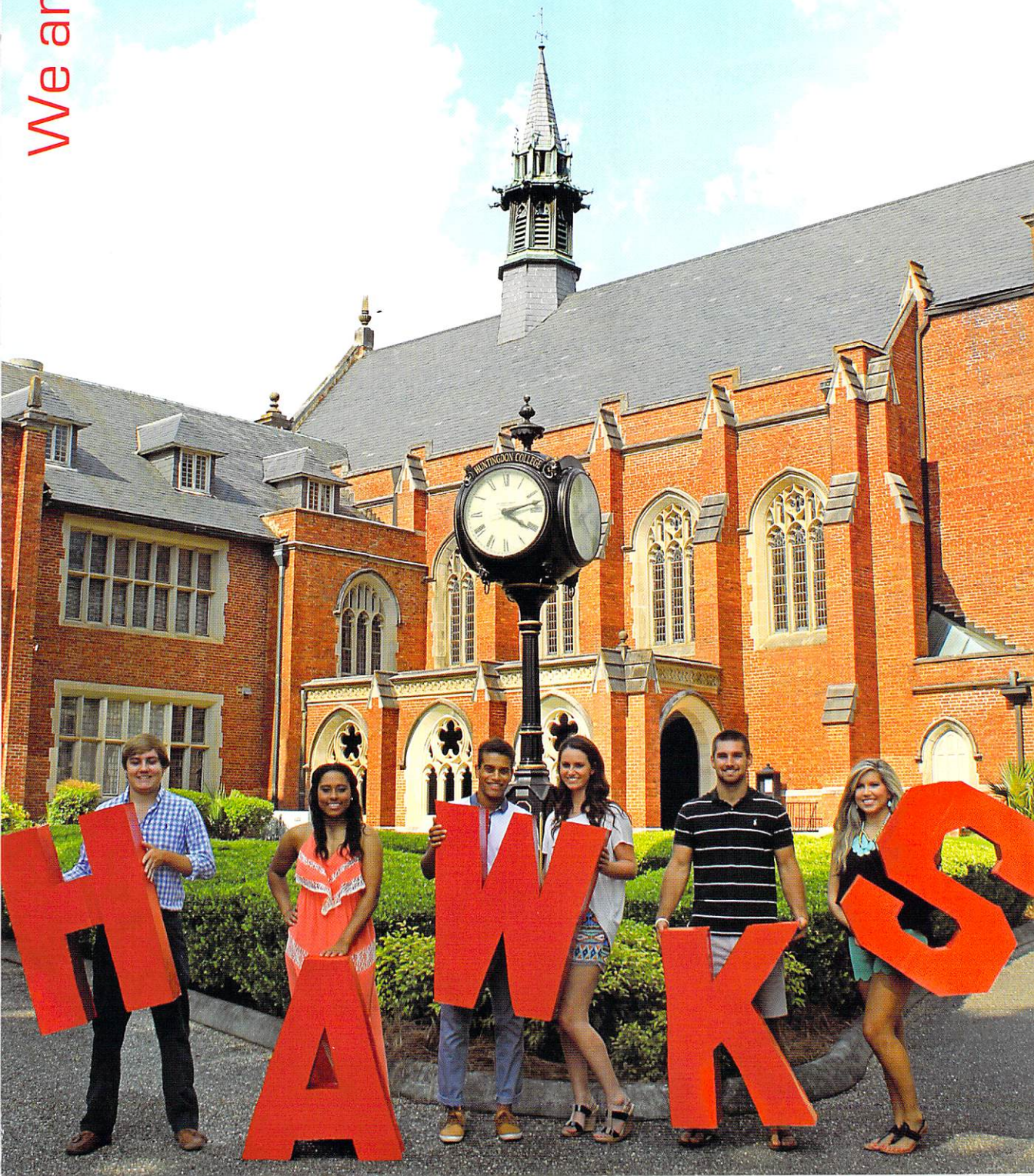

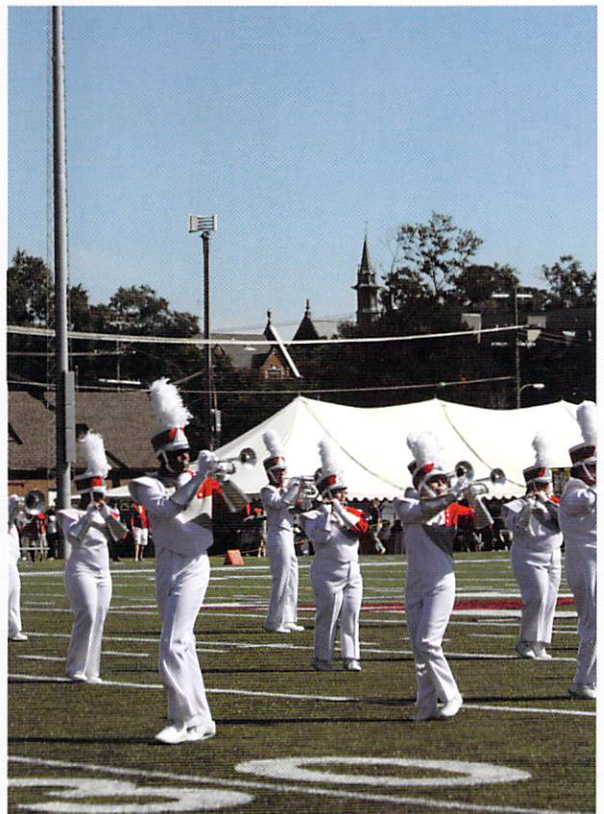

Founded: 1854; coeducational liberal arts college of the United Methodist Church

Location: 67-acre campus in a safe and beautiful residential neighborhood of Montgomery, Ala., state capital; three hours from the Gulf Coast

Student Body: Approximately 1100 students in traditional and Evening Bachelor's Degree programs, representing nearly every county in Alabama, approximately 30 states, and several countries; 50% male, 50% female; student-to-faculty ratio, 14:1

Academic Programs: A liberal arts core curriculum leads to a broad range of academic majors, pre-professional programs, and teacher education programs for elementary, secondary, and P-12 levels.

Technology: A laptop computer is provided for each student for use all four years and is his or hers to keep upon graduation.

Travel: Travel/study opportunities during the junior or senior year are offered either at no additional cost or for modest fees.

Campus Safety: Campus security operates 24/7 year-round; Right to Know information is posted on the Web at <http://hawk.huntingdon.edu/oia/HEAdisclosures.html>.

Financial Aid: More than \$20 million administered annually to nearly 100% of students; scholarships available for achievement, circumstance, and academic merit; participatory grants in cheerleading, choir, pom squad, and marching band; dependents of Alabama Power, ALFA, and U.S. military; Methodist students; and others

ADMISSION AND FINANCIAL AID CHECKLIST

- Apply for admission at www.huntingdon.edu or by calling (800) 763-0313 or (334) 833-4497 to receive information by mail.
- Request that your official high school/college transcripts be sent to the Office of Admission.
- Have your ACT/SAT scores sent to the Office of Admission (if scores are not posted on your official final transcript).
- Apply for a Personal Identification Number (PIN) for yourself and, if you are a dependent student, ask that your parents apply for a separate PIN, at www.pin.ed.gov. This will allow you and your parents to apply for financial aid online.
- Complete the 2015-16 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at www.fafsa.ed.gov as soon as possible after January 1. The Huntingdon Title IV code is 001019. Aid options may include federal grants, federal loans, and federal work study.
- Explore local financial aid sources with your high school, community, church, or employers. Last year, Huntingdon students received more than \$1 million in funding through outside sources.
- Check out no-cost Internet scholarship search engines, such as www.scholarshipexperts.com and www.fastweb.com. In general, Huntingdon discourages the use of scholarship services that require fees.
