he goals of The Lott Leadership
Institute (LLI) for High School Students are to develop leadership skills in young citizens and to prepare them for college. To achieve these goals, the Lott Leadership Institute brings together student leaders from across the Southeast to earn college credit on the University of Mississippi campus and begin the study of leadership.

Included in the program are opportunities to interact with college administrators, student leaders, and active community members while participating in current-event debates, discussions, and decision-making activities. The program culminates with a six-day trip to Washington, D.C. (two travel days included), during which the participants see the federal government in action, hear from national leaders, and tour the nation's Capitol. The ideal outcome is for students completing the program to put their new skills to work for the betterment of their high schools and communities.

Two sessions will be offered this summer. Only 20 students will be selected to attend each term.

A principal, guidance counselor, or Ole Miss recruiter must nominate a student in order for the student to receive an application.

Accepted students are enrolled in two University of Mississippi classes and must attend all meetings. The trip to Washington, D.C., is a mandatory component of the program, and students must fly to and from D.C. with the LLI group. Students unable to commit to the dates below should not be nominated for consideration.

2013 DATES

Session I: May 25-June 27, 2014 Session II: June 22-July 25, 2014



Students selected to participate in Session I should be prepared to arrive on the Ole Miss campus beginning at 1:00 p.m. on May 25, 2014. The trip to D.C. for this session is tentatively set for June 19-26. Participants may depart campus on June 27.

Students selected to participate in Session II should be prepared to arrive on the Ole Miss campus beginning at 1:00 p.m. on June 22, 2014. The trip to D.C. for this session is tentatively set for July 17-24. Participants may depart campus on July 25.

NOMINATION ELIGIBILITY

The ideal nominee is one who is interested in leadership and public service.

Upon nomination, an Application Packet will be mailed directly to the student at his/her home address. The selection committee will select the 2014 participants and a number of alternates from the pool of applicants.

- The nominee must be an 11th grade student in good academic and conduct standing at the time of admission.
 The nominating school may be public, private, parochial, or even home-educated.
- The nominee must have 15 high school credits (by June 2014) with at least a 3.2 GPA. If the nominee has at least a 25 ACT (composite) or an 1150 SAT (CR and M), the student can be nominated with only 10 high school credits, provided he/she has at least a 3.5 GPA.
- The nominee must have permission from his or her principal (indicated by the principal's signature on the application).

NOMINATION DEADLINE

Nominations from schools MUST be received in the Office of Pre-College Programs (PCP) no later than January 17, 2014.

Once the Office of Pre-College Programs receives a nomination, a full application packet will be mailed to the nominee's home address. Students must submit their completed application and required documents prior to February 15, 2013, to be considered.

SELECTION PROCESS

From the group of nominated applicants, a committee comprised of University officials will select 40 total applicants, 20 per session. Students will be ranked on demonstrated interest in public policy, leadership, concern for others, and academic achievements. The committee will attempt to form a class with diverse interests and experiences.

COLLEGE COURSEWORK

Participants will take Political Science 101, Introduction to American Politics, which emphasizes constitutional principles of the U.S. government. Students will investigate political procedures, electoral processes, and political institutions. Participants will also take Speech 102, Fundamentals of Public Speaking, in which they will learn how to organize, prepare, and deliver speeches in a variety of public forums. Combined, these courses provide 6 hours of college credit.

TRIP TO WASHINGTON, D.C.

To enhance their studies at the University, LLI students will travel to Washington, D.C., for a four-day field trip (not including two travel days). While in D.C., participants will visit with federal officials, including U.S. Representatives and Senators. Students will also tour the Capitol, the National Archives, the Smithsonian, and various other attractions of the capital city. Additionally, participants will visit with leaders in industry and in the nonprofit sector.

HOUSING

Students accepted to the program will be housed with the Summer College for High School Students Program in a residence hall designated specifically for them. Adult staff as well as counselors selected from the UM Lott Leadership Institute student body will mentor and supervise program participants. While in D.C., students will be closely supervised by University staff and student counselors. The group will travel together and be housed in a secure setting.

COSTS


Once a student is accepted to the program, he/she is required to pay a non-refundable \$100 registration fee to reserve his/her place in the program. Students selected to the Lott Leadership Institute for High School Students will receive a scholarship to help with the costs of room, board, tuition, and travel. Actual program costs to the student will be a \$500 program fee (this amount is in addition to the registration fee) plus books, weekend meals, snacks, and souvenir/spending money. Students selected to participate are strongly encouraged to fundraise the required funds themselves rather than paying out of pocket. This is a leadership-building exercise that is part of the program experience. An individual's financial situation should not be a deterrent to application to and successful completion of the program.



Dear Principal or Counselor:

The Lott Leadership Institute at the University of Mississippi is pleased to announce that the annual Lott Leadership Institute for High School Students is now taking nominations for the two 2014 sessions. A total of 44 (22 per session) outstanding rising seniors (current juniors) will be invited to the University of Mississippi campus to participate in this program promoting leadership and public service. These students will earn six hours of college credit while participating in discussion groups, panels, and debates on issues confronting leaders of the 21st century. Participants will also travel to Washington, D.C., to participate in discussions with state and national leaders. All participants in the program will receive a scholarship that will cover the 6 hours of college tuition, 100% of the cost of housing, a campus meal plan, travel costs, housing in D.C., and meal per diem for the D.C. trip. The only cost to the student will be a \$500 program fee and a \$100 registration fee. Students are encouraged to raise the \$500. Cost should not prevent a student from applying! This is a phenomenal opportunity for these students and I want to encourage you to nominate your best and brightest students that are interested in leadership and public service.

Since we are limited to the number of students who may participate, we are asking you to **nominate up to five students** who are **currently juniors** in high school. These students must exhibit leadership ability in your school, an interest in public service and must meet the entrance requirements to Ole Miss outlined in the enclosed brochure. Upon receiving a student's completed application, we will evaluate the application to ensure entrance requirements are met. His/her application is then sent to the selection committee where he/she will be judged on the basis of demonstrated leadership and involvement in the local school and community.

Enclosed with this letter is a more detailed brochure. Also enclosed is the nomination form for your selected students (you are allowed to nominate up to five students). Simply fill in the nominees' names and requested information then return it to us. The deadline for receiving your nominations is **January 17**, **2014**. Once we receive your nominations, we will send full applications to your students. Completed applications must be received in our office by February 15, 2014. Students will be notified of their acceptance by March 30, 2014. In order to meet these deadlines, we need your nominations as soon as possible (fax or e-mail preferred).
